The Adjutant's Report

Trip to the 117th National Reunion, Murfreesboro, Tennessee, July 12-14, 2012



I can only recommend to every SCV member to attend a Reunion if at all possible. It is an inspiring event and strengthens the resolve to carry on the good fight. Still, from Europe, the travel costs are very high. I am grateful to the local Murfreesboro Camp for their hard work of hosting a National Reunion. I might not have made the trip if it had not been in Murfreesboro, for that town has many personal connections for my family. So I had to go. Besides, I wanted to be able to shake the hands of many of the people who supported our project to restore the Tomb of Captain Thomas Jefferson Page, C.S.N. in Rome, Italy.

I spent several days visiting cousins in Texas and Kansas. From Nashville airport I went to Columbia, TN, to Elm Springs, SCV International Headquarters for my appointment with Executive Director Ben Sewell. Ben is ex-military so we understood each other very well. He brings his dedication now to the SCV and its cause. He showed me some of his family's relics, including his Grandfather's UCV card, which looks very much like our present SCV membership card. He gave me a personal tour of the house. I could personally thank Holly Pittman, who handles correspondence and membership for the Army of Northern Virginia for her excellent service to Europe Camp. I saw the Conference Room, where the Executive Council sits. I could also stand before the grave of Lt. Simon Cummings of the *C.S.S. Alabama* who died and was buried in South Africa for over one hundred years until he was brought here in about 2005. I then went on to The Blockade Runner, a WBTS sutler, where I bought some flags for the Re-dedication ceremony in Rome.

The next day I spent going to the grave of Lt Thomas Miles, N.C. Militia, my Revolutionary Patriot ancestor and looking up family records in the local offices. The Reunion began on a Wednesday with a GEC Meeting open to the membership. On Thursday, there were greetings from the Tennessee state government. There were addresses by several distinguished gentlemen. The executive officers gave their reports. There were several constitutional amendments put to the assembly. The Reunion site committee had recommended accepting the offer of Richmond to host the 2015 Reunion, arguing that the SCV needed to have a presence there for the last Sesquicentennial Reunion. But Dallas, Texas also wanted the 2015 Reunion. A voice vote to accept Richmond was so close however, that C-in-C Givens denied the recommendation. Then a member called for a division of the house. This required a written poll to be taken, which could only be done on the Saturday. Elections too were put off until Saturday.

In the afternoon, there were bus tours. My tour went to Elm Springs and to General Nathaniel Bedford Forrest's Boyhood Home, which is owned by the SCV.

We also participated in the unveiling of a new Confederate monument in the small town of Eagleton.

On Friday, there were more speeches and reports and business to be held. I had the singular honor of being allowed to address the assembly. Although I have made public addresses several times in my life, to be welcomed by 400 of our SCV Compatriots in a standing ovation, was, to be honest, one of the high points of my life.

I had intended to speak, among other things, about the Confederate Flag in Europe, but had dropped the idea because of other, more important points. But then the SCV Advocate General had made a comment on exactly that subject just minutes before I came to the podium. So, as a preface to my remarks, I recalled the times we have seen the Confederate Flag here in Europe – that it was present at the Slovenian National Independence Ceremony, etc. I said that, to people abroad, the flag was another American flag that it meant many things to many people – Dixie, country music – but also *resistance to tyranny*, at which point the entire house rose in applause.

Then I spoke about our work in Europe – that we carry out the Charge (which I in part read out in German) just as faithfully in Europe as in the States. I spoke of our members, who are just as proud of their Confederates as anyone living in Georgia or Indiana. I spoke of our von Borcke and Page missions and invited them all to join us in Rome for the Page Tomb Re-Dedication Ceremony.

And I reminded our stateside compatriots that the next time they salute the Confederate flag at their local meeting, they should remember that they are part of a world-wide network, bound across time and distance with those men in gray. I left the podium again to a standing ovation. Gentlemen, they know about us – and they appreciate all that we do.

The tour on Friday included a memorial service in the courthouse where I believe my great-great-grandfather was married. We then attended a ceremony at the mass grave of Confederates killed at the Battle of Murfreesboro, Dec 31, 1862/ 2 Jan 1863. Then a Southern style barbecue at a mansion where President Davis once stayed. Saturday began with Army meetings. At one time there was a move to hold the National Reunion at Gettysburg in 2013, the 150th anniversary of the Battle. This would have been a major public relations opportunity. However, the Confederation instead voted for Vicksburg. But Army of Northern Virginia Commander Frank Ernest wants to have his Army Reunion at Gettysburg the week before Vicksburg. Gentlemen, please consider going to Gettysburg, if you can't go to Vicksburg.

I used this occasion to hand out certificates of appreciation to especially the South Carolina Division Commander Mark Simpson and to the Camps who contributed to the Page Project.

Then long lines formed in the hotel corridors to vote. After a long delay, the results finally came: The vote was for Richmond. Michael Givens was re-elected C-i-C. Long-time friend of Europe Camp Charles Kelly Barrow was re-elected Lt. C-in-C.

The buses were waiting for the final tour of the Reunion - the Murfreesboro Battlefield Park tour.

This was especially important to me because two of my ancestors fought at that battle – on opposite sides! Lt Edward McLarren, 18th Ohio Infantry, was on the extreme left of the Yankee line on 2 Jan 1863 when General Breckenridge pushed them back. Among Breckenridge's troops was Private Hawkins I. Brooks, 45th Tennessee Infantry, fighting less than two miles from his home – and less that ½ mile from Lt. McLarren! After the War, their descendents went to Texas. And here I am!

(It was clear I was "home": The Great-Great-Grandfather of our tour guide was my Great-Great-Grandfather's brigade commander!)

And finally, the Ball was extremely good. Some gorgeous dresses, some impressive uniforms, good food and over 300 guests! The Debutants were presented, awards were presented and the Virginia Reel was danced. A beautiful ending to a wonderful Reunion.

A final word.

Although I was brought up in *Southern* Maryland, it has been a long time since I was in the South. And it really is different from the rest of the country. Different accents, different foods, different attitudes, different history. And they really do say "y'all"! I was especially made welcome by Glenn Taylor of the Murfreesboro SCV Camp and his wife. Theirs was a personal hospitality I will never forget.

A wonderful experience, which I can only recommend!



A local decision to renovate the actual wall our memorial plaque was intended for, brought a delay, but the commemoration **will** go ahead.

The Misericorde Church is adjacent to the site and is where Semmes is thought to have visited during his time in Terceira. The Church has kindly agreed to incorporate our commemoration into the morning worship on the 26th. I have arranged at short notice, an illuminated page to be produced and this will be displayed in the 'silent prayer chapel' until such times as the plaque is sited. Including myself there will be eight 290 members attending and I am hopeful we can get some attendants from different countries too.

The town officials are pleased with the visit and we got an invitation to a meeting with them. Time for a press interview has also been arranged.

The deep religious feelings of the people of the Azores are expressed in their festivals, which keep up the devotion and colour of the past. Mon, Sept, 3 6:30 p.m St. Wendel Volksbank,Bahnhofstr. 20



"Nicola Marschall 1829 - 1917 A painter from St. Wendel in the American South", will be available during the exhibition times.


WAR TO THE KNIFE AND THE KNIFE TO THE HILT: SPANISH HEROISM OF 1812 FOR IMITATION IN 1862



THE CURTAIN DRESS OF "GONE WITH THE WIND" OR: AN SOUTHERN LADY NEVER LOSES HER GOOD APPEARENCE

"There was a land of Cavaliers and Cotton Fields called the Old South. Here in this pretty world, Gallantry took its last bow. Here was the last ever to be seen of Knights and their Ladies Fair, of Master and of Slave. Look for it only in books, for it is no more than a dream remembered, a Civilization gone with the wind...."

"Gone with the Wind" is an absolute classic, a movie which needs no introduction to the reader, for that reason we will point out from time to time single scenes and contents of this legendary motion picture rather than to review the whole movie. Today we will tell you the story of one of the most famous robes of film history: the magnificent dress of Scarlett O'Hara made by taking some green portieres in her home, Tara. A masterpiece of improvisation, it shows pretty well how important it was to maintain a serious ladylike appearance to underline an already existing superior-class female dignity (although Scarlett's sometimes even ruthless survival methods are not entirely representative for Southern women).

The following scene leads to the idea of creating the dress: Scarlett has to pay a special 300 dollar tax or she will lose Tara. <u>Text from the original 1939 script;</u> <u>Mammy's Negro accent in authentic transcription</u> (note the loyalty maintained to her mistress, Mrs. Ellen O'Hara, although she has passed):

Scarlett

(she enters to Mammy) Oh, Mammy! (she goes to the window and stands looking out)

Mammy

(she goes to her, lays a consoling hand upon her shoulder) You been brave so long, Miss Scarlett. You jes' gotter go on bein' brave. Think 'bout yo' Pa like he useter be.

Scarlett

I can't think about Pa. I can't think about anything but that three hundred dollars! (she moves away from the window and, wretchedly, across the room.)

Mammy (mumbling)

Ain's no good thinkin' 'bout dat, Miss Scarlett. Ain' nobody got dat much money.

Scarlett (to herself)

Three hundred dollars ... three hundred dollars ...

Mammy

Nobody but Yankees and Scalawags got dat much money now.

Scarlett (stops still in her tracks. She frowns. Then, low, but quite matter-of-fact) Rhett!

Mammy

Who dat? A Yankee?

Scarlett (frightened by her own idea)

Be quiet.

Scarlett goes to the mirror, stares at herself. She runs her hands over her thin figure, pinches her cheeks.

Scarlett

I'm so thin and so pale, Mammy. And I haven't got any clothes!

Suddenly she straightens up as she catches a glimpse of the green portieres hanging at the windows. She swings around abruptly and with sudden brisk decision, walks to them.

Scarlett (fingering the material and looking up)

Scoot up to the attic and get Ma's old box of dress patterns, Mammy.

Mammy

Whut you up ter wid Miss Ellen's po'teers?

Scarlett

You're going to make me a new dress.

Mammy

Not outta Miss Ellen's po'teers! Not while Ah got bref in mah body!

Scarlett (still staring at the portieres)

Great balls of fire! They're **my** portieres now!

(She jerks down the portieres, pole and all; drapes the material over her shoulder; turns back to Mammy)

I'm going to Atlanta for that three hundred dollars, and I've got to go looking like a queen!

The Curtain Dress, best symbol of Scarlett's will to survive during Reconstruction, was worn in three scenes of the movie: the jail scene in which Scarlett asks Rhett Butler for financial assistance (in the movie the dress is in fact made for that purpose), the scene in which Scarlett walks with Mammy through the streets of Atlanta, filled with crowds of reconstructed rabble, Scalawags and Carpetbaggers, and finally the scene with Scarlett meeting Frank Kennedy (and who is immediately targeted by her as next husband).






Not a mugshot of Vivien Leigh for police records, but a dress and make up still, taken before starting the first scene (sudden visit to Rhett Butler).
